Highlights from the Board of Trustee meeting April 12, 2022

Off-Campus Programming: Palliser School Division offers collaborative learning opportunities and partnerships between school and community partners. Opportunities include Work Experience, RAP, Green Certificate, Exploratories and Dual Credit with post secondary partners including University of Lethbridge, Lethbridge College, SAIT, NAIT, Ambrose University, Prairie College, Olds College, and the University of Calgary. Five schools are piloting a Transition to Life (Post Secondary) Course, two schools are piloting a culinary course and FarmEd offers an immersive, place-based education centred on Agricultural practices and "farm to table". The Trades and Vocational Education Committee (TAVE) is co-chaired by our division and developed the strategic
framework aimed at building students' trades, apprenticeships, and vocational education knowledge and experiences.
Wellness: The Wellness goal of the division focuses on students becoming literate in mental health, gaining knowledge that will provide them confidence in their pursuit of living a healthy life. In the past year, there has been an increase in Family School Liaison Counselors (FSLC) team support. The Coordinator of Counseling, along with the team of FSLCs, provide one to one and group counseling to students in anxiety, trauma, grief and a multitude of other areas. The team supports schools through responding to crises and the Making Connections Worker are liaisons between families, schools and community. In the past year, there were over 748 classroom presentations related to wellness.
Literacy: The division-wide literacy team carries out the Literacy Framework which emphasizes the key areas of Oral Language and Vocabulary, Disciplinary Literacy, Balanced Literacy, and Digital Literacy across grade levels and subjects. Experts in these areas have supported leaders in developing professional learning and aligning school-wide approaches to literacy. This year, staff attended over 40 division-wide professional learning opportunities related to literacy. Emphasis has been placed on strategies to further support staff with implementing changes in the K-3 English Language Arts curriculum.
Numeracy: A numeracy team has been established to engage leaders, teachers, students and community to further the division's numeracy framework. Focus will continue on key areas of elementary numeracy: number sense and fluency, mathematical reasoning, visual mathematics, problem solving, and rich tasks. An online platform will allow staff to share resources, plans and projects across the division

Highlights from the Board of Trustee meeting May 10, 2022
Coaldale High School and Recreation Centre: Things are looking up, literally, at The Coaldale High School and Recreation Centre! Ward Bros. Construction is on schedule and the steel is currently being erected. Ward Bros. provides regular updates that are shared on the Palliser School Division website and social media platforms. It is anticipated that the school will open in September 2024. Open Houses for the public are planned for May 24, 2022, at R.I. Baker School from 6:00-7:30 p.m. and at Kate Andrews High School on May 25, 2022, from 6:00-7:30 p.m. At the Open Houses, members of the public will learn from the architects about the design of the school.
The Education Plan: The annual Education Plan was accepted by the Palliser Board of Trustees and will be shared with stakeholders and Alberta Education. This year's plan is aligned in response to the new Alberta Education Assurance Framework. The completion of the plan has shifted to the spring, allowing the division to take the time necessary to engage stakeholders in the cycle of continuous improvement and to adjust the plan based on results and feedback. By broadening stakeholder engagement, fourteen elements to be used to provide assurance to our stakeholders were established. These desired states have been identified and shared with school communities and will form the basis for identifying future strategies and frameworks as work continues with stakeholders within the planning cycle. This year's plan has embedded Palliser School Division's broad areas of focus of Wellness, Literacy and Numeracy within the five domains of Student Growth and Achievement, Teaching and Leading, Learning supports,

Governance and Attending to Local and Societal Context and will be achieved through a focus on student engagement, inclusion, assessment practices and mental health supports.
English as a Second Language in Palliser: The Palliser School Division continues to see a rise in the number of English Language Learners (ELLs) across the division with 3,370 students identified as ELLs this year, an increase of 70 students over last year. An ELL coordinator was added to provide additional support to students. New early literacy assessments and interventions are being implemented and a Palliser Literacy Assessment Framework has been created outlining the recommended use of these assessments. ELL Locally Developed Courses are offered to help ensure students receive credits while obtaining the level of English proficiency necessary for high school courses. Palliser works with multiple agencies to support new families coming to Canada.
